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2024 Property Tax Statements to Be Mailed Early September

GAINESVILLE, Ga. (August 27, 2024) – With the arrival of property tax season, the Hall County Tax Commissioner's Office is preparing to issue approximately 99,000 tax statements for real and personal property.

This year's Hall County property tax statements will be mailed early September – with a due date of Nov. 15. The tax bills will also be available for viewing on the Hall County Tax Commissioner's website at hallcountytax.org.

"Our robust website is a convenient resource for property tax information," said Darla Eden, Hall County Tax Commissioner. "The site makes it much easier to find out what you owe, how to pay, and who to contact with questions."

Information on hallcountytax.org also includes up-to-date information on the payment status of property tax bills for all parcels as well as records and receipts for up to ten years.

For properties that changed ownership during the year, the official property owner on Jan. 1 is responsible for that year's property tax. If property is purchased or sold after Jan. 1, it is the responsibility of the buyer and seller to determine who will pay the owed tax by the due date. You should refer to your property closing documents or the closing attorney to determine tax liability for the current year to ensure proper payment to the Hall County Tax Commissioner's Office.

For property owners with property-tax escrow accounts, tax information is made available to mortgage companies for payment; however, the property owner is still responsible for ensuring taxes are paid by the due date.

Mail Delays Continue to Impact Local Government Operations

The United States Postal Service (USPS) delivery delays continue to impact the Hall County Tax Commissioner's Office and other government agencies.

Save a Trip. Skip the Line.

"Our office is dedicated to offering a range of payment options that cater to our community's needs." Eden said. "I encourage property owners to utilize our many convenient tools to 'save a trip and skip the line.'"

- Make your payment quickly and securely online at hallcountytax.org. Online payment methods include E-Check (\$1.00 flat fee), PayPal, PayPal Credit, and debit/credit card (2.19% fee). Most major credit cards are accepted. PayPal Credit is available for eligible residents, provides a same-as-cash option, and is interest-free for six months if paid in full. (Terms and conditions apply.)
- Another option is payment by mail, using the pay slip and return envelope provided with the statement, to P.O. Box 1579, Gainesville, GA 30503.
- Individuals may also use the secure, 24/7 drive-up drop box located under the breezeway across from the entrance to the Hall County Government Center (HCGC) at 2875 Browns Bridge Road.
- If you prefer, Tax Tag Agents at the Tax Office's Customer Interaction Center are ready to assist with credit and debit card payments over the phone at 770-531-

6950.

- Payments may be made in person. Appointments are preferred. Please visit www.hallcountytax.org/appointments.

In Hall County, the Tax Commissioner's primary role is the billing and collection of local property taxes. Property values are determined by the Hall County Board of Assessors, while millage rates are set by the County Commission and Board of Education as well as each of the municipalities within Hall County. One mill equals \$1 of tax for every \$1,000 of assessed value.

If you own property within the city limits of Gainesville, Flowery Branch, Buford, or Oakwood, you will receive a separate city tax bill from that municipality in addition to the Hall County property tax statement.

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
