Hall County Tax Commissioner Secures Over \$124,000 in Delinquent Taxes Following Aeon Global Health Closure

Gainesville, GA (July 13, 2026) – The Hall County Tax Commissioner’s Office has secured \$124,028 in delinquent personal property taxes, including a current-year jeopardy assessment from Aeon Clinical Laboratories, following the company’s closure at the Aeon Global Health facility in Centennial Industrial Park.

The collection follows multiple prior attempts to resolve four years of unpaid taxes. When it became apparent that Aeon had closed and begun selling equipment, the Tax Commissioner’s Office initiated statutory levy procedures to protect county and school revenues that were at risk of being lost.

Levy and Legal Actions

As part of the levy process, members of the Property Tax Division, serving in their capacities as ex officio deputy sheriffs, were accompanied by the Hall County Marshal’s Office during the site visit to ensure statutory compliance and secure the premises. Together, they safeguarded approximately \$2,200,000 in equipment by placing locks on the building to prevent the removal of assets connected to outstanding tax obligations.

To further safeguard taxpayer interests, the County Attorney’s Office obtained a temporary restraining order from the Superior Court, ensuring the property remained protected while the levy and jeopardy assessment were carried out.



The actions taken ultimately resulted in full payment of all outstanding taxes, fees, and the current-year jeopardy assessment, securing revenue that supports essential county and school services.

Statement from Tax Commissioner Darla Eden

“Ensuring that every taxpayer meets their fair share of responsibility is essential to maintaining trust in our tax system,” said Tax Commissioner Darla Eden.

“When taxes go unpaid, it places an unfair burden on residents and businesses who do meet their obligations. The revenue collected directly supports our schools, public safety, roads, and county operations, and we will continue using every lawful tool available to protect those vital services. We appreciate Aeon’s cooperation in bringing this matter to a close, which allowed the county to secure revenue owed without further proceedings.”
